Gas-Powered Leaf Blowers are Prohibited in the Town of Corte Madera

The Town of Corte Madera would like to remind residents and contractors that effective March 1, 2020, the use of any gasoline-powered leaf blowers will be prohibited at any time within the Town (Corte Madera Municipal Code 9.36.040 adopted November 19, 2019). We ask that persons currently operating gasoline-powered leaf blowers discontinue their use.

We want you to know that leaf blowers can still be used as long as they are not gasoline-powered and as long as they are used during the times allowed by the Corte Madera Municipal Code. The Corte Madera Municipal Code states that it shall be unlawful for any person to operate any leaf blower during the following times:

1. Residential Properties other than Multi-Unit Residences: No leaf blower may be operated at any residential property that is not a multi-unit residence except between the hours of nine a.m. and five p.m. on weekdays and between the hours of ten a.m. and four p.m. on Saturdays.
2. Other Properties and Use by Town: No leaf blower may be operated at any multi-unit residence or nonresidential property, and no leaf blower may be operated by on-duty staff or contractors of the town, except between the hours of seven a.m.

and five p.m. on weekdays, and between the hours of ten a.m. and four p.m. on Saturdays.

3. Sundays and Holidays: It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a leaf blower in any area of the town on Sundays or federal holidays.

Additionally, it is important to note that the Corte Madera Municipal Code also states that it shall be unlawful for any person who operates a leaf blower within the town to allow any leaves, dirt or any other debris blown to enter the storm drain system. All leaves, dirt, or any other debris blown on to public property or in the public right-of-way must be cleaned up and removed.

A violation of any provisions of Chapter 9.36 of the Municipal Code shall constitute an infraction punishable by a fine not exceeding \$100 for a first violation, \$200 for a second violation of the same ordinance within one year, and \$500 for each additional violation of the same ordinance within one year (Gov. Code, § 36900).

2020 Commission and Board Recruitments

The Corte Madera Town Council is requesting applications from Corte Madera citizens who may be interested in serving on the Town's Planning Commission, Parks and Recreation Commission, Flood Control Board, Sales Tax Citizens' Oversight Committee and Representative to the Marin/Sonoma Mosquito and Vector Abatement District. With few exceptions, all Corte Madera residents who are registered voters of the Town are eligible to apply for appointment.

Planning Commission: a five member body that oversees the Town's planning process. Currently the two-year terms of three (3) Commissioners will expire on June 30, 2020. One additional seat may be vacated as of April 7, 2020, allowing for an interim appointment to be made for the final 15 months of the term, expiring June 30, 2021, after which the selected appointee could apply to be appointed to a full two-year term. Much of the Commission's time is devoted to reviewing permit applications for home remodels and additions. The Commission works to balance the needs of individual families for more living space with the need to protect neighborhood character. The Planning Commission also works on longer range issues. The Commission meets on the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m., with occasional study sessions scheduled as needed.

Parks and Recreation Commission: an advisory board that recommends policy and procedures for parks and recreational facilities, recreation programs, park development and park maintenance. The two-year terms of three (3) Commissioners are expiring on June 30, 2020. One additional seat may be vacated as of April 7, 2020, allowing for an interim appointment to be made for the final 15 months of the term, expiring June 30, 2021, after which the selected appointee could apply to be appointed to a full two-year term. Meetings are held on the 4th Monday of each month at 6:30 p.m.

- **Parks and Recreation Youth Commissioner** – This 2-year appointment ([see flyer](#)) is open to applicants who are high school students age 18 or younger who wish to serve their community as the voice of the community's youth regarding Parks and Recreation events and activities. Youth Commissioners can earn community service hours based on meeting attendance.

Flood Control Board: advises the Town Council on all matters affecting flooding in Corte Madera. Examples of duties of the board are to review and report on the flooding impact of current and proposed flood control and storm drain projects, and to review and report on flood management plans in order to define what actions are necessary to reduce flood conditions in the Town. The two-year terms of three (3) Board members are expiring on June 30, 2020. Meetings are held bi-monthly on the 2nd Monday of even months at 6:30 p.m.

Town of Corte Madera Representative to the Marin/Sonoma Mosquito & Vector Abatement District (2-year term, currently vacant) The main purpose of the Board of Trustees of the MSMVCD is to organize and carry out an effective mosquito and vector control program and to develop a budget adequate to staff and support the program. This seat is currently vacant and preference for the appointment will be given to a person with strong interest in the prevention, elimination or control of mosquitoes and other arthropods known to be potential carriers of infectious diseases, or presenting a public nuisance. The Board of Trustees meets on the second Wednesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. at District Headquarters, 595 Helman Lane, Cotati, CA.

ATTENTION RESIDENTS OF THE FOLLOWING STREETS: Laurel Drive, Deer Run, Meadow Valley, Stetson Avenue, Alta Way, and Alta Terrace, North Willow Avenue, Redwood Avenue, Valencia Lane, Baltimore Avenue, Palm Avenue and Pixley Avenue

The Town of Corte Madera has embarked on another phase of its comprehensive vegetation management program to further increase defensible space, improve ingress & egress for first responders, improve primary and secondary evacuation routes, improve vehicular sightlines, and enhance pedestrian and biker safety. This is a town-wide initiative.

Landscape on Private vs. Public Property

Any tree or vegetation planted on private property is the property owner's responsibility, including if it is encroaching into the public right-of-way. The California Fire Code (Section 4907.2) and ordinances adopted by the Town requires that vegetation be cleared 15' overhead to allow for safe and unimpeded passage by emergency vehicles. The code also requires 10' clearance from the sides of roads and driveways. This is achieved by cutting all dead grasses to a minimum of 4 inches, removing all tree limbs that are within 10 feet of the ground, providing horizontal spacing between shrubs and trees, and cutting and removing all fire prone plants.

One-time Town Abatement Offer

The Town recognizes that street and public right-of-way abatement can be daunting and expensive for a homeowner. Using Measure F funds, the Town is offering a one-time abatement at no cost to the homeowner to bring our streets into compliance. Participation is voluntary. A homeowner can choose to opt out by contacting the Town Resilience Coordinator at (415) 924-6362 and requesting an opt out form. If the homeowner chooses **NOT** to participate, the homeowner is still responsible for meeting the compliance requirements detailed above. Failure to comply with abatement requirements will result in a Wildfire Hazard Warning Notice requiring the hazard be abated within 15 days. Residents who fail to comply will be noticed. The Town will hire subcontractors to abate the property to conform with the code. The bill for these services will be sent to the homeowner for payment. Failure to pay may result in a special assessment or lien against the property.

Prioritization of Streets

In collaboration with Central Marin Fire Department, the Town has prioritized streets to be abated starting November 2019. These streets have been identified as having excessive roadway encroachments creating fire and safety hazards that place residents and first

responders at considerable risk in the event of an emergency. Mitigation of these encroachments will also enhance vehicular, pedestrian and bicyclist passage.

Please note that your streets have been scheduled for abatement to begin as noted below and as time and weather permits.

- Weeks of February 10-13 and February 18-20
 - Lower Laurel Drive, Deer Run and Meadow Valley
- Week of February 24-27
 - Alta Way and Alta Terrace
- Week of March 2-5
 - North Willow Avenue, Redwood Avenue, Valencia Lane, Baltimore Avenue, Palm Avenue and Pixley Avenue
- March 16-19, 23-26, March 30- April 2
 - Stetson Avenue

Votes for U.S. Women: The 72 Year Struggle: A Presentation by Dr. Patricia Dougherty, OP



It took 72 years from the first demand for the vote in the 1848 Declaration of Sentiments at Seneca Falls, New York until the 19th amendment was ratified by the 36th state, Tennessee, in August 1920. Three months later, over 9 million women voted in the 1920 presidential election (out of an eligible 26.9 million). This slide lecture looks at the origins of the suffrage movement in the abolition movement and the experience and activities of women who devoted their energy and lives to the struggle for the vote. In 1872, Susan B. Anthony was arrested for voting in a presidential election; she was tried, convicted, and fined for "knowingly voting without having a lawful right to vote." Forty-five years later, Alice Paul and others were arrested for obstructing the sidewalk outside the White House and thrown into prison, beaten, force fed because they asked for the vote by picketing the White House. We will meet many people in the movement; some well-known such as Susan B Anthony (Aunt Susan) and Elizabeth Cady Stanton and others who may be less famous such as Lucretia Mott, Sojourner Truth, Ida B. Wells, Carrie Chapman Catt and Alice Paul.

Professor Emerita of History at Dominican University of California, Professor Dougherty has taught European history and women's history for 35 years.

- Polls open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.
- Voters may register and vote provisionally at their polling place
- The Marin County Elections Department is open from 7 a.m. until 8 p.m. for registering and voting provisionally
- Vote-by-mail ballot envelopes must be signed and postmarked on or before March 3rd
- Voters can drop their vote-by-mail ballot (in its signed envelope) at the Elections Department or any polling place by 8 p.m.

Planning and Building Director Adam Wolff: Wolff reported attending the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) Special General Assembly Meeting where there was discussion on the upcoming changes to housing laws and increases in the Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) numbers throughout the state. He mentioned there will be an emphasis on social equity for the upcoming cycle. There will be expanded Housing and Community Development (HCD) oversight on methodology and allocation meaning that HCD will have more authority to appeal methodology that is provided to the local governments. He also mentioned there will be an emphasis on expanding fair housing. Overall, he stated that these changes are going to require more work from staff on implementing a housing element that complies with state laws and incorporates all of the housing numbers that local governments are going to be given. Wolff also mentioned that an open house and information sharing session will be held on March 19th from 7pm to 9pm at the Corte Madera Community Center, to kick off the objective design and development standards project that is currently being worked on by several representatives from various jurisdictions within the county.

Councilmember David Kunhardt: He reported that the Transportation Authority of Marin (TAM) is working on a Marin-Sonoma bike share program where both counties would have various locations to store electric bikes for the community to use. He also mentioned that TAM is working on expanding the use of electric vehicles. Regarding Safe Routes to School, he mentioned they are still working on making improvements at the intersection of Pixley and Redwood Avenue. Lastly, he reported that the Marin Telecommunications Agency (MTA) will be dissolving completely and transferring its responsibilities to the Marin General Services Authority (MGSA).

Vice-Mayor Eli Beckman: He reported that Larkspur has withdrawn from Central Marin Sanitation Agency (CMSA). He mentioned the Chamber of Commerce was holding a

mixer at the new Fieldwork Brewery located in Town. He mentioned that the League of Cities is asking for support on SB 54 and AB 1080 which relate to plastic pollution reduction. Lastly he reported that the Resiliency Advisory Committee (the committee working on the Climate Adaptation Plan) went really well.

Councilmember Bailey: He thanked the Mayor for attending the Central Marin Police Council meeting that he was unable to attend. He reported attending the Marin County Council of Mayors and Councilmembers Legislative Committee meeting.

Councilmember Ravasio: He reported attending the Central Marin Police Council meeting and the Fire Council meeting where Councilmember Bailey was honored for his service and where audits were also approved. He mentioned that a presentation on pensions was also provided for the Police Council and lastly, he completed his term as Chairman and Catherine Way will now be the Chair woman.
